CLASS PLACEMENT POLICY

Plans for September 2016 are being made this month. Part of the process at school is student placement. Parents should be aware of the school policy regarding student placement. There are a number of factors to be considered before placing a student in a class. Teachers:

- Highlight learning styles and strengths
- Match learning styles with teaching styles
- Note the degree of independence and work habits
- Highlight any special adaptations or methods used to ensure students feel comfortable and confident
- Reflect upon social and personal characteristics
- Male/female composition of class
- Consider previous year's placement
- Note student relationships that promote positive learning situations

Parents who have children with specific medical or educational concerns or needs should pass this information to us in written form to ensure that we place each child in the best learning environment possible.

A placement letter or email must be given to the principal no later than June 15th, 2016. It is important to note that after considering all factors the final decisions on all placements will rest with the school staff. Please note that next year we are expecting Mr. Preston to be back with us however, sadly, Mrs. Zolob, Gr. 1/2 and Ms. Guerin, K/1 will not be returning to Chase River. Thank you for your support in making the best possible decision for all children.

Developing a new transportation policy for 2017-18

The district's current Transportation Policy is outdated as it relies on a Ministry of Education policy that no longer exists. As such, the province of BC does not provide targeted funding for transportation. Across the province, districts have proposed changes to transportation in an effort to realize savings or to redirect funds back into the classroom.

Did you know?

– The district transports 1,723 students in Nanaimo and Ladysmith areas (December 2015). - Approximately 43% of registered riders are

courtesy riders, and do not qualify under the current

eligibility requirements.

- The 2015-16 annual student transportation budget is \$1,575,995.

- There is no legislative requirement for school districts to provide transportation services.

The district intends to engage the community in its review of the current transportation policy and the development of a new policy and administrative procedure that would begin September 2017.
